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

FROM PETER'S PEN SCOOTING INTO ADVENT

In late September I underwent reconstructive surgery on my right foot and ankle. While recovering, I have been very limited with

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my mobility as weight bearing has not been an option while healing. While indoors, I am dependent on the aid of a walker, knee scooter, stair lift or elevator. Thanks to the Honourable David Onley I have also had access to an electric mobility scooter which enables me to get out of doors. On good days, I have used it to ride all the way to the church and back, though most days it is for shorter jaunts.

David informed me that it was the same scooter he used to visit Queen Elizabeth II at Buckingham Palace while he was serving as the 28th Lieutenant Governor of Ontario. The royal connection is wonderful, yet as much as I love our late Queen, the scooter has more importantly served to deepen my appreciation for David and everyone whose mobility is challenged and it has also deepened my faith.

While riding on the scooter I have been surprised by the discovery of sidewalks so severely sloped towards the street that it is amazing the scooter has not yet tipped over. Many a time I have had to use my good foot to balance the scooter. Cracks in sidewalks and heaving sections also offer challenges. I have even discovered sidewalks that end abruptly in the middle of a block and few places where walkways come to an end without the necessary dip to exit or enter. And I don't think I can count the number of times I have had to stop to remove obstacles like leaf bags, or garbage bins off of the path.

One day I was in the scooter making my way along a sidewalk just off Yonge St. when a large pickup truck pulled up onto the same sidewalk twenty feet ahead of me completely blocking my way. The driver hopped out, crossed my path and made his way towards a store before I finally got his attention. Even when I was only five feet in

front of him, he didn't seem to notice me. Once he did, I discovered it was all unintentional as he immediately moved his truck to make way for me. And though some have hurried past me to get through a door with no thought of holding it open, I am grateful for all who have taken the time to step aside, or hold a door, and sometimes even offer to help. My recovery hasn't been all fun and games, but it has certainly opened my eyes to some of the challenges of living with a disability.

This has also been a good preparation for the celebration of the incarnation or the coming of Christ

in the flesh at Christmas. While I have never pictured Jesus on a scooter, Jesus certainly noticed those who would ride scooters or use wheelchairs in our world. When Christ came down at Christmas, there was no one beneath him. No one was overlooked, for love and nothing less came down at Christmas. Christ is here for us in love. Thanks be to God.

 CAUSES that focus on community engagement impact stories - international projects through CBM - advocacy - mission/ cross cultural experiences (suspended during Covid).

One cause of note recently was the restoration of the kitchen ministry at Oneida, a ministry

that continues to serve hundreds of children and their families with meals and a sense of community.

Over many years, YPBC Women's Ministries have had the privilege of being connected to and supportive of CBWOQ and its diversity of ministries, taking delight in:

• Implementing and supporting THE DOROTHY NEAL NEW INITIATIVES FUND. In late 2016 YPBC Women's Ministries inaugurated this Fund in partnership with CBWOQ. Dorothy was a member of YP and an exemplary leader and mentor among Baptist Women through CBWOQ and the North American Baptist Women's Union (NABWU). It was our desire to honour Dorothy and to encourage Baptist women in ministry and leadership as we live out our faith together. Funding new mission initiatives that target vulnerable women, children and youth at risk is a key element in CBWOQ's vision of freeing women to do ministry at home and overseas. One example of a new initiative is the House of Refuge in Qwa Qwa South Africa, a maternity home for orphaned or at risk pregnant teens. The maternity home is a safe place to be cared for and supported through pregnancy and beyond, allowing girls to stay in school, as well as the opportunity to learn both life and parenting skills within the home. Girls are connected to godly mothers or grandmothers within their community who will mentor and support them while at the House of Refuge with the hope that it will continue when they leave. In her note of thanks to CBWOQ, Aimee Hurtubise, referring to the new initiatives grant, writes in her "greetings to the wonderful, generous Baptist Women" that "many girls as well as their children will get to know the love of Christ and have the hope of a better future because of you. Thank you once again for everything."

- Encouraging/supporting UPTICK Baptist Women Growing Female Leaders for the Kingdom, a 10 month experience for young female Kingdom leaders with a heart for Jesus as they serve and mobilize their communities. UPTICK focuses on building healthy discipleship cultures while tending to spiritual and personal growth and discovery in both online and in person contexts. Kathleen Wilson, whose excellent article on this leadership development programme featured in the YP Newsletter, is an integral member of the UPTICK leadership team.
- **Promoting** *LIVE* magazine, formerly known as the award winning, LINK and VISITOR that was edited by Esther Barnes, a well known member of YPBC. *LIVE* magazine, now edited by Renee James is issued bi-monthly by CBWOQ. As well as being available by subscription online, issues of *LIVE* have been donated to the YPBC's Gladstone Library.
- **Circulating** E LINK, a free monthly newsletter focusing on current and future events and also published by CBWOQ.
- Providing THANKOFFERING lunches/dinners at YP for many years where our generous congregation has had the opportunity to learn about and lend financial support to the CBWOQ ministries.
- **Donating** Baptist Women's bi-annual RECOMMENDED READING books to the Gladstone Library.
- Participating for many years in the BAPTIST WOMEN'S WORLD DAY OF PRAYER in November where Baptist Women from 7 continental unions come together to pray for issues they are facing and to give to grassroots ministries, projects developed and run by Baptist women and that focus on vulnerable women and children. To

encourage us to pray, Dorothy Neal loved to remind us that there were women who so valued the privilege of praying for their sisters in Christ that they would swim across rivers in order to join with other women for this designated day of prayer in their particular continental union!

The current Executive Director of CBWOQ, Helena Bergen, is passionate about equipping and empowering women to fulfill their God-ordained callings and to see the development of vibrant and dynamic communities of Baptist women across Ontario and Quebec that are marked by a deep and transformational knowing of God's love and purpose for them as well as a love for each other.

Within the context of a dynamic community of believers and as women of faith who love and encourage one another, we're gratefully equipped and empowered to live out our 'God ordained callings'.

Advent is a season where we look forward to new beginnings. For the newly arrived refugee family in our church, this season has been full of new beginnings! Irad, Sana, Rehab and Azaliya arrived for the first time in Canada in late September, just as the summer-like weather made for a pleasant first impression. Soon enough, the colder weather came and with it the new experience of making their way outdoors in coats and boots – Irad commented on the remarkable workmanship of Canadian winter clothing to keep us warm! Azaliya started Grade 8 at Deer Park Public School - her first school experience in her life and so far, she is very much enjoying learning and making friends. In fact, she was in class when the first snowfall arrived in November and her classmates helped her celebrate seeing snow for the first time and playing in it at recess.

Of course, no newcomer arrival is without its challenges as the family has been faced with the seemingly endless task of filling out forms and visiting government offices to obtain things like bank accounts, mobile plans, Permanent Resident Card photos, OHIP cards, SIN numbers, vaccinations and flu shots. Nevertheless, they are settling in nicely into our community and will be spending the next few months finalizing many administrative matters, obtaining more permanent housing and seeking opportunities for volunteering and employment. Please keep this family in your prayers - I know they very much appreciate them! OUT OF THE COLD

The Out of the Cold (OOTC) ministry of hospitality for 2021/22 was held outdoors in the spirit of Matthew 25: 35 (For I was hungry and you gave me something to eat, I was thirsty and you gave me something to drink [NIV]). For the 2022/23 season, our mission has been expanded to focus on the message of the Parable of the Good Samaritan, Luke 10: 29 (And who is my neighbor?) and 36-37 ("Which of these three do you think was a neighbor to the man who fell into the hands of robbers?" 37 The expert in the law replied, "The one who had mercy on him." Jesus told him, "Go and do likewise." [NIV]). Although

we welcome all guests, our main focus this season will be on what we can do to help our neighbours from Davenport to Eglinton. This season's OOTC will be offered every Wednesday from 5:30 pm to 8:30 pm, from November 2nd until April 5th of 2023 - a total of 23 weeks. The need is great: our numbers have tripled in the first month. We offer nutritious meals for up to 100 guests at the church in a welcoming and safe environment; in addition to hot dinners, we offer nutritious take-away lunches, clothing and toiletries, TTC tickets, health information, and gift cards. In the new year, we are planning to resume foot-washing. The DOXA youth started the season off by purchasing and preparing take-away kits of warm items and toiletries for our guests.

OOTC is grateful for the generous financial support and the commitment of the volunteers from Yorkminster Park and the wider community.

HISTORY

The Beginning of YPBC (from a Draft of "The Ministers" by Allan Williams for The History Committee)

On Sunday morning, September 10th 1961 the two congregations that merged to form the new congregation of Yorkminster Park - Yorkminster Baptist Church and Park Road Baptist Church – met together for the first time. The ministers listed on the calendar that day were the Reverend Emlyn Davies, who had been the minister at Yorkminster since January 1951, the Reverend Murray J. S. Ford, who had been the minister at Park Road since November 1956, and the Reverend Bruce W. Neal, who had recently been called to Yorkminster on the recommendation of Emlyn Davies. This first Sunday of the merged congregation was also Bruce Neal's first Sunday as a member of the ministerial team. These three men served together until the end of September 1962 when both Mr. Davies and Mr. Ford left by previous arrangement and the Reverend Harold Cooke Phillips became Interim Minister of Yorkminster Park with Bruce Neal as Minister of Christian Education. In January 1963 the Reverend John Galloway joined the team as Minister of In September 1963 Mr. Phillips' Pastoral Care.

interim ministry ended and for the next 16 months Bruce Neal and John Galloway shared the ministerial duties, with Mr. Neal sometimes preaching on Sunday mornings and Mr. Galloway on Sunday evenings, but with the preaching duties largely filled by a roster of guest preachers including Mr. Phillips, the Reverend Ivan C. Morgan from McMaster University and, for three weeks in February 1964, **the Reverend John N. Gladstone**, from Bromley, Kent, England. Mr. Gladstone subsequently accepted a call to become the Minister of Yorkminster Park and arrived to take up this role on February 11th 1965.



PEACE BE WITH US ALL

Peace Be With Us All: The Best Christmas Present Ever



What are those three subjects again??? You know, the ones that you're never ever, ever, ever supposed to discuss at the supper table? Oh yes, those ones! Well a few years

ago, around such a mid-October weeknight dinner table, my daughter and her stepfather got "into it" about the *political* prong of that verboten trilogy of mealtime topics. Alas, as so many can attest (from their own woeful "gone south" dinner table family squabbles), *this* one, between two of the people I love most in the world, didn't end well. The grateful, week-after-Thanksgiving afterglow vanished quicker than leftover pumpkin pie.

Things were said—regretful, heat-of-the-moment, thoughtless and unkind things—on both sides of the literal and metaphoric table. In the days that followed, although both sides secretly lamented how out of control their "table talk" had gotten that evening, neither would bend. Neither would apologize. Neither would concede their part in the escalation. And me? I was "stuck in the middle." An ice-cold "shut out" prevailed, at first, for one week, then another, and then throughout November. It became clear to me, as we turned the calendar to December, that Christmastime was going to be strained if apologies were not expressed and accepted. My birthday was in the first week of December (and, lol, still is!), so I asked my husband for a truce. For my sake, and his, too, he did try, but the authenticity of his apology didn't strike enough of a chord to make peace. As The Dixie Chicks once sang, my daughter pretty much replied (to me), "I'm not ready to make nice. I'm not ready to back down..." She had decided to dig in for the duration. She had decided to "just settle her brain for a long winter's nap," (to riff off of T'was The Night Before Christmas!).

As you can imagine, I was heartsick. She didn't want to visit, not even for a cup of *tea*, let alone a festive *meal*. The oddest, saddest family Christmas dinner table that I'd experienced in years. I visited my daughter on Christmas Eve at her place, and then Christmas morning, too, for a little breakfast, but *she* didn't come to *us* for a meal that year. Nor the following spring, summer, fall, or even the *next* Christmas. If I saw my daughter at all, our rendezvous had to be "offsite."

Unprompted by me, my husband tried two more times to apologize over that next year. He actually asked for my daughter's forgiveness, once he had settled down and decided to reclaim his rightful elder person's/parental-figure leadership role. By phone voicemail message and by email he appealed but, no, it wasn't happening. I asked our ministerial team to pray for my family's healing. I lit candles at many an Iona service.... "Lord hear my prayer... at the Throne of Heaven." I never gave up praying for reconciliation. It was all I could do.

At the beginning of yet another Christmas season, for what would have been the third year that my daughter was absent from our festive table, my husband asked me, yet again, what I wanted for my birthday. I still vividly recall sitting on the back kitchen steps, my elbows on my knees, my chin in my hands, shaking my head back and forth as I thought. I let out a big sigh, and then, without saying a word, or even knowing myself what would happen next... my "waterworks" flowed. (That's what we used to call them when I was a little girl-when playing Monopoly with my family, if I didn't get the "Waterworks" property, I would cry. Lol. And then all my family members would say, "Oh brother, here come Nina's waterworks!") My poor husband didn't know why I was crying. When I finally caught my breath I told him that there was only one thing that I want for my birthday, more than anything else, probably ever again... and that was for him to try again, and this time succeed in patching things up so that our daughter would come to Christmas dinner this year. "That's all I want. I don't want you to do any chores for me. I don't want any fancy jewellery, any designer clothes, overpriced dinner at a pretentious restaurant... I don't want a spa day. I don't want to see a show. I don't want anything wrapped in red paper with golden ribbon... All I

want is my *daughter* at our Christmas table, and for things to go back to how happy they were between us all, *before*."

These two were always such fun together... always laughing and yucking it up. Just listening to them go at it together could make me laugh until I gasped for breath! That was their natural bent when in each other's company. Both of them with such wickedly funny senses of humour, that riffed off of one another so well... like a professional duo comedy act from days of old. And they were good friends. That's what made it all the more the pity—that this schism had happened because of nasty words spoken in haste. Because these two were/are the funniest, wittiest people in my world, I always enjoyed being an witness to their banter, as they played one game or another around the kitchen table, while I puttered preparing food or whatever. All was right in the world—in my humble little corner of it, anyway when this kind of scenario was mine to experience any evening. And I missed it so very much. I missed them together so very much.

And so, because he wanted to, and because I asked (so emotionally), once again, and with the fullest of humility, my husband asked for my daughter's forgiveness and invited her to our Christmas dinner. He let me read his email draft. I agreed that it was earnest and all that he could do, and then somemuch more emotive than the first try a year earlier. After hitting "send," all that was left for us to do was wait. And pray. One hour, and then another, and then another. We waited the rest of the day, but no reply. Such tenterhooks! The following day the phone rang at noon. My husband picked up. It was our girl! And she said "Yes." It was a short and sweet call, but it was a start. "Yes," she would come to our home on Christmas Eve, and yes, she would come to Christmas Day dinner, too! I hovered anxiously all through their call, wondering what was being said, but getting the joyful gist from what I could hear from our end. And even if I couldn't hear anything, his face telegraphed all I needed to know!

When he got off the phone I sobbed and sobbed and sobbed... and then sobbed some more. I was a blubbering fool! I startled myself by how much I cried. I couldn't seem to stop. My blubbering was like a runaway train. Finally, I was done. No more "waterworks" for me. My husband stood by the

entire time, intuiting why I was so tearful. When I'd dried my eyes-and got an introspective grip on what was going on for me, emotionally-I explained that I realized, during that crazy crying jag, that I had been holding on to the sorrow and the stress of this family tension for nearly three years and that it was eating me up inside. While it may not have technically been my "fight," I was one of the casualties of this family feud. It was my experience, too. And it was finally over. Peace for my family was coming, poetically, at the "Peace on Earth" time of year. Mine were the tears of relief. The tears of joy. Utter joy. Mine were the tears of someone who was exhaling all of my anxiety, and then drawing in blessed deep breath for what seemed like the first time in 1000 days.

The perfect, first-place, best-ever Christmas present, of course, is that of the birth of our Dear Lord/Baby Jesus. (All this excessive Christmastime consumerism is beyond unnecessary, and, to me, anyway, often borders on offensive—but that's an article for another year.);) Second place as "best-ever Christmas present," to me at least, goes to: "Yes, I will come to our family Christmas dinner this year." That answer/that gift given and received will forever remain my very best-ever birthday and Christmas present, all wrapped into one... adorned with that perfect metaphoric cherry-red paper and golden ribbon atop—and it didn't cost a single dollar. Lord, thank you for hearing my prayer.

May any of your own family's rifts, tiffs or strains be healed this Christmas.

Blessings and Merry Christmas to All. And Peace Be With You. Peace in our families. Peace in our communities. And Peace on Earth. Deep Peace.

We look forward to the day when YP Gallery will be open. Until then, here is an update from Nelson Cheng who was slated to launch our 14th season.


It is a long time since my last update! I hope you are staying safe and keeping well as we transition back to normal life






IN THE GALLERY
