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
The Cover - a Christmas Greeting Post Card, December 1924, from a family collection.

PETER'S PEN

In September we started an online Bible study on Wednesday evenings called Lost in Translation in which we have been looking at phrases from our everyday language that

come from the earliest translations of the Bible into the English language. We chose about 90 such phrases and have found others along the way as we have looked at five or six each week. Among other things we have considered what the phrase means to us today and what it meant originally and then tried to discern where the good news is and how God is continuing to speak into our world today through the common phrase.

Each week has also featured a different leader and it has been encouraging and inspiring to see the depth of Biblical insight among

so many leaders in our church. And not just the leaders! Along the way we have also had thoughtful and discerning comments and questions from those in the group, although with upwards of seventy in attendance each week we are not able to hear from everyone. Nonetheless I keep getting asked who is this person or that person and they are asking about people because they have been so blessed by their participation. Like me they are finding it all so encouraging. We are discovering along the way that God is speaking to us afresh not simply through common phrases but through the common folk of our own community.

And then there are those from outside too. For example when Rob Inman recently led our study his three sisters were present Mary from Grimsby, Pat from Parry Sound and Margot from Nelson, B.C. However, they are not just there for their brother as they have been with us on a number of Wednesday evenings. The pandemic has forced us to take our Life Groups and Bible Studies online and in

doing so we have been able to welcome so many people from beyond the city limits. Mary Welby of Thunder Bay, the daughter of the late Guy and Ethel Staples, has also been with us each week. One member of our church came into the group one week and said, "I have to interrupt before we start and say 'hello' to my cousins from New Brunswick who I see are with us tonight." We have also had visits from Americans Milton Fletcher and Amos Jones who are also worshipping with us Sunday by Sunday.

And there are others we have only met in recent months though many of them have been worshipped with us for some time. And then there is Ray Kibler III. Ray had sent me several encouraging emails through the years after watching our service online,

but it wasn't till I was flipping through the three pages of participants that his name jumped off the screen at me. I had read his lovely notes, but had never seen his face or heard his voice. Ray has two doctorates and has pastored Lutheran churches in the US and now lives in Claremont, California where a disability confines him to his apartment. But his passion for Christ and for the unity of the church are contagious and he has been a blessing to us all fall. On the first Saturday of Advent, Ray offered an inspiring reflection in our Walking Together online Bible Study. If you missed it, please subscribe at:

FROM THE MINISTER OF PASTORAL CARE AND DISCIPLESHIP



The season of Advent and Christmas is a beautiful time of year. For most of us, our memories around this time are complicated; happy and sad memories uneasily blending together because it seems we are conditioned, against all experience to the contrary, to believe that in this season we must be happy. When we are not it can throw us off. We can sometimes treat sorrow and sadness like Mary and Joseph were treated long ago, not really wanting to give them room at Christmas, not wanting them to be in the way, but wander they will until they are given a place to rest.

My grandmother on my mother's side was Ukrainian. We were doubly blessed in our family at both Christmas and Easter because we celebrated everything twice. Even as we did so, there was a tradition we had of the empty chair. Our dining room table was just large enough to fit twelve if we had two people at each end but before we sat, my grandmother taught us to remember the empty chair, the space left empty for all those we had loved and lost. When I looked at the chair I could see many faces, aunts and uncles, my grandfather and finally one day, when I looked at the empty chair, I could see my grandmother too. By giving sadness a place at the table we were better able to also welcome joy; that gift that only God can give that is so much greater than happiness. Joy that makes us smile with delight at the memory of someone, even as we wish they were still with us.

Jesus did not come into this world because everything was going very well and he wanted to join in with all the singing and dancing and feasting, even though we know he was very fond of celebrating too. Jesus came because there was a great emptiness in the world that only he could fill. What a gift we have in Jesus. For every empty space in our heart, he is there, ready to fill us with his peace, his comfort, his hope, and when we are ready for it, his joy also.

At Yorkminster Park we have a wonderful tradition. With thankful hearts this season, let us make room if we have not yet done so for Jesus, our Lord Emmanuel, add a chair for him too, and welcome him to be a part of our lives.



Some Lessons Learned

One question posed to our congregation was the following:

Can you please tell us the most important lessons you have learned?

When asked which is the greatest commandment, Jesus replied, "Thou shalt love the Lord thy God with all thy heart, and with all thy soul, and with all thy mind ... Thou shalt love thy neighbour

as thyself. On these two commandments hang all the law and the prophets." (Mt 22:37-40)

Another question to the congregation was the following:

What message would you like to give to others in our community?

Re-Opening

On behalf of **Health and Wellness**, we would like to acknowledge Mr. Al Livy for his dedication and committment to leading the Re-Opening Task Force here at YPBC and his entire committee and others who have helped in any way. It is through this committee and all our volunteers and staff that we have been able to reopen our doors, safely and fairly. The Committee informed us that beginning on December 18th the church will require proof of full vaccination and ID of all who enter the building. The decision was made after careful and prayerful consideration in good faith believing it is the best way to continue to do our best to ensure the safety of all who enter. Authorized medical exemptions are accepted, but need to be presented to parishnurse@yorkminsterpark.com.

PRE-REGISTRATION AVAILABLE

Come to the Yorkminster Park Centre entrance and provide proof of vaccination along with ID, at which time your name will be placed on a master list. This will hasten your entry into the church. Members of the committee will be available at the to assist people in pre-registering on Wednesdays from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. and before & after church in the

Narthex on Sundays. Proof of vaccination can be downloaded at: covid19.ontariohealth.ca

We will continue to follow most of the same COVID-19 Protocols which were used successfully when we opened in the fall of 2020, including wearing masks at all times, and social distancing however, congregational singing is now allowed - you must continue to wear your mask, and we are able to celebrate the Lord's Supper as part of our Morning Worship Service - in a slightly different manner. Rather than distributing the elements in the traditional way, upon arrival worshippers will be given the bread and cup in a sealed package which they will be invited to open, eat, and drink at the appropriate time in the service.

We are happy that our children and youth have returned to worship in-person. There is a HYBRID model for children & youth:

- 11:00am begin worship with all in the service
- 11:15am after children/family prayer, children/youth and their leaders will go to Cameron Hall for their DOXA bible study time and join others via zoom
- Wear masks & social distance

FROM THE YPBC WOMEN'S EXECUTIVE ...

CONNECTING THROUGH PRAYER - COURAGEOUS LIFE



Recognizing that life can be challenging for women on many fronts, Baptist World Alliance (BWA) Women began 70 years ago to connect women around the world in order to bring encouragement and strength by standing together. BWA Women offers a supportive community of women in 156 countries who are building into lives through. connections and resourcing so we can become *courageous* women who love God deeply and are living out who God has designed us to be from the beginning of creation. As women thrive, the world benefits.

The BWA Women's World Day of Prayer on the first Monday of every November, is a special time for standing in solidarity with our sisters across the globe and provides a unique opportunity to pray for each other in over 80 languages. This is a time to discover and experience what a massive sisterhood we are part of as we stand with each other in prayer, a beautiful time of celebrating our diversity and our unity as Baptist women within seven continental Unions come together around the throne of God to hold each other up to His loving arms. The Baptist Women of North America, as the North American branch of the BWA Women's Department and the Union to which we as Canadian Baptist women belong, encourages women from 17 member organizations across Canada and the United States. Courageous Life was the underlying and connecting theme for this year's Day of Prayer and to guide our praying and thinking, three Bible studies were offered by Baptist women from Australia, Malawi and Tobago, each one reflecting on the verse of their choice from Hebrews 13:5b-6, Deuteronomy 31:6 or Esther 4:12-17; 5:1-6.

In the Hebrews passage, God assures us that he'll never let us down nor leave us so that we can boldly claim:

God is there, ready to help; I'm fearless no matter what. Who or what can get to me?

(The Message)

In Deuteronomy, Moses at the age of 120, is exhorting His people to be strong and courageous and to have no fear or dread because of *them* (enemy nations),

...because it is the Lord God who goes with you and will not fail nor forsake you.

And in the story of Esther, Queen Esther is placed in a royal position to assist in the delivery of God's divine plan for His people. Her divine moment comes when she courageously responds to Mordecai's urging to appeal to the king even though it was against the law to approach him without his invitation. Esther was willing to die to save her people.

The bold and daring words common to all of these scripture passages declare a courage that comes only because the Lord is at our side and will never leave nor forsake us. In all three studies, courage is assumed to mean the ability to push through fear, not the absence of fear - to do something that frightens us or to appropriate the power to act in the face of Fear can rob us of the courage hurt and grief. necessary to do what we know is right. It can keep us from doing the will of God. 1 Timothy 2:7, a verse also referenced, reminds us that God has not given us a spirit of fear, cowardice or timidity but of power, love and sound mind. Acknowledging the pandemic that has changed the way we do things as well as recognizing the enduring needs and deeply concerning issues in our relationships and in our world, we are assured from God's word that with His help we can gather the courage to forge forward to face the changes and challenges that make life difficult and create fear, while not allowing fear to prevent us. We continue to be called on to love and reach out to the vulnerable, the sick, the suffering and the poor in this difficult time - to uplift each other, be with each other and to pray for and

strengthen each other, empowered by God himself who is the creator and perfecter of our lives. And one person can make a difference as the story of Esther shows us. Esther's fearless faith in God made a difference - it resulted in her life being spared and so were the people of God! The apostle Paul reminds us in his letter to the Ephesians, Chapter 6, that courageous living requires us to be strong in the Lord and in His mighty power - to stand firm - to dress well for the battles we face - to be prayerful and faith filled and to fearlessly make known the mystery of the gospel to a world in great need. *The Lord is my Helper, I will not be afraid*.

It is of note that the YPBC Women's current mission statement also references the story of Esther where we affirm that *for such a time as this*, as women with a passion for serving God, we invite and welcome all women into our community and encourage women to discover their full potential in Christ as we live and serve under the influence of God's Spirit. God has given *us* a spirit of power, love and sound mind, not one of timidity and calls us to an uncommon courage as *extra ordinary* women of God. In the Introduction of her book, *SHE*, *Five Keys to Unlock the Power of Women in Ministry*, Karoline Lewis encourages us with her understanding of power:

To claim power from within is to be grounded in the absolute truth of who you are. The key before all keys is to tell the truth the about yourself... Power that is acknowledged as coming from the place of truth about one's self is truly the kind of power that makes a difference ...true power comes from identity and authenticity.

Courageously and authentically living out of our truest identity as God's own beloved daughters, enlivened and empowered by His Spirit and His help, we are emboldened to respond to the challenge that is as fresh today as it was some years ago when Janet Clark, our Women's Retreat speaker, issued it to us:

What would we be doing if we weren't afraid?

The courage we need to live - to be visionary - to minister, is reflected

in the following *Prayer for Courage* that was included in the November 2021, BWA Women's Day of Prayer:

Dear God give me courage.
Give me courage to speak out,
To stand up for the right
To stand with those who are vulnerable
To stand up for those who need encouragement
Even as I need theirs.

Make me a courageous woman who is empowered by your Spirit

To do what you would have me to do

To be who you made me to be.

Give me the courage to admit my failings where I

am weak

And the courage to ask forgiveness when I have wronged.

Give me courage to follow you even when voices around me - within me

Say I'm not enough or it can't be done by me. I need your courage to change and to grow.

I need your courage to thrive Because it is only in thriving that the world will see YOU, Your love your grace, your strength, your power, your glory.

And I want that, Lord Jesus. Do it in me, Do it through me,

Because the world needs you. It is in Jesus' name I pray.



OUT OF THE COLD

Out of the Cold was something I had always heard about during the winter and holiday seasons.

We hear

announcements about less fortunate people and how we should donate to them. As a child with no idea how to help and no money to donate, the most I could do was hold the cans of food my mom had purchased and place them in a box. Then that was the end of it. I wouldn't think about the people who would receive the food and socks orwhy they needed them.

In more recent years, I've given more thought to these people. How and why should I help? Yorkminster Park has given me opportunities to

learn and serve. A few of our youth nights included serving others and learning about the Out of the Cold program. We helped serve meals and were able to interact with new people. I heard from other volunteers about how these people had experienced rough times, so it could be difficult to be in a happy

mood. It made me realise that simple interactions with them are more important than I had previously assumed. The first night I volunteered, I was especially nervous about the possible scenarios that could come up, but they soon became forgotten. I was able to see how friendly the people were. They were familiar and comfortable with the others, which made me feel welcome as well. The experience allowed me to gain a better understanding of homeless people and see them in a new light, rather than any preconceived or stereotypical ideas I had

about them.

After serving the people in the Out of the Cold program, I was able to think of them more emotionally rather than as

random people I would donate to but never meet. At a recent youth gathering, we collected socks for the homeless and wrote Christmas greeting cards for them. I continued to think of how to spread kindness, especially for people that have constant struggles and need extra love during the cold holiday season. The Bible verse Proverbs 3:27 came to mind. It says. "Do not withhold good from those who deserve it when it's in your power to help them." We are all able to make a difference in people's lives. Sometimes I can be blind to the simple ways I can help someone, which prevents me from making a difference. Remembering the love God constantly gives to me helps me remember how he is also constantly giving love to the people around me. He sees the value in everyone so I should as well. I learned that through big and little acts, I can make a change in a person's life.

THE GIFT OF KINDNESS, AT CHRISTMASTIME AND ALWAYS



Outside, the twilight was soft and purple-pink on that bitterly cold December 14th in 2009. Inside, we were creating as warm and peaceful an ambiance as possible. Classical music from CBC radio wafted down the hall into the living room. The Christmas tree

lights—the only illumination required—bathed the space in a golden glow. All this to lovingly say goodbye to our darling 13-year-old Soft-Coated Wheaten Terrier, Angus (photo, High Park). I did my

best to carry on for the sake of Christmas, but on the *inside*, I was a mess. Embarrassingly so.

In those days I faithfully walked 5K through High Park every Saturday with Cindy—a dear friend who, like Angus, was strong on intuition and loyalty. Knowing that I was grieving, on the Saturday following the 14th, Cindy declared that *she* was selecting the route for our walk, and that *my* job

was to play along. What was she up to? I could tell it was *something*! I surrendered. Off we went into the High Park *neighbourhood*, rather than High Park proper. "Do you want to know where we're going?" "No," I replied. A Christmastime adventure on a bright, sunny [but still bitterly cold] Saturday was just the thing to lift my sprits.

We arrived at the wrought-iron door of a grand home on High Park Avenue. The mystery continued. We knocked and waited.

The door opened, and what do you think came bounding out from behind his master's legs (Cindy's sister was the "master," as it turned out)?! A 10-year-old Wheaten named Connor that we were going to take with us on our walk! God bless Cindy's


thoughtful, kind heart. She'd arranged a play date with a *Wheaten*, "just for me!" (The line "Just for me!," declared as a indulgent celebration, always makes me think of that scene from the Christmas movie, *Home Alone*, when Kevin McCallister—that rambunctious eight-year-old with a penchant for clever, elaborate traps for protecting himself from the robbers—orders a pizza they way *he* likes it best, but never gets when his family orders... "A cheese pizza, *just for me*!")

Connor looked amazingly like Angus, and behaved like him, too. If it weren't for his slightly larger frame, he could've been Angus' doppelgänger! After choking back tears, quelling the lump in my throat and lavishing that little guy with a few cuddles and coos, away we went—with me, of course, at the other end of the lead.

Connor and I flew down the avenue leaving Cindy in

our salty dust. And I mean that almost literally. I felt so light, like my legs were airborne, with my body parallel to the sidewalk! And there was lots of salt on the sidewalk that had deteriorated to dust, so, indeed, for that part, we actually did literally leave Cindy in our dust! Connor

was in glee to run, run, run! And *I*? As hard as it was keeping up, I was in utter bliss submitting to his "puppy" energy. I was chilled on the way *to* Connor's house, but from our departure onward I was aglow with warmth. So was Cindy, knowing that she was the conduit for this joyous moment that we were *all* experiencing.



I felt my cup runneth over for that entire walk. It was a wondrous healing collection of moments all strung together, suspended in time. Made all the better because it was Christmas. I had no idea how much I needed that therapeutic experience that day, nor how much that simple gift of a friend's thoughtfulness would mean to me then and forevermore. It gave me back my Angus *and* my Christmas spirit. I'll always remember that serendipitous *earthly* Christmas gift



as one of my all-time favourites. Freezing cold, takeyour-breath-away day and all.

Here are three lessons that *I* gleaned from this personal tale of "Christmas Past." (I wonder what *your* take-aways might be?):

1. It's easier than we may think, to be of simple yet profound service to another if we pause (no, not paws!);), look, listen and then empathize with that other's pain or troubles. Although we can't always meet all of the needs of others, if we care enough, the key is to open our hearts to thoughtfully identify what actions and supports we can lend, however simple or humble, to help see that person through their crisis.

In the case of "Cindy, Connor and me," Cindy whole-heartedly journeyed that scripture *extra mile* on our friendship bond by identifying something important to me and acting upon it. Without realizing, I *needed* to love up, and make a fuss of, a beloved Wheaten one last time. Cindy assessed that —and delivered.

James 1:17

Every good gift and every perfect gift is from above, coming down from the Father of lights with whom there is no variation or shadow due to change.

2. When you're the "passenger," you don't always have to know where the "Driver" is taking you until you get there. Trust God. Have faith. On that December morning I trusted the process and had faith that Cindy was taking me somewhere pleasing. I "Let go and let God." When in the position of wanting or having to trust and exercise faith in a respected friend, family member, colleague, neighbour, etc.—especially through this *second* pandemic-times Advent season—practice extended patience with that other person's methods and motivations before concluding that they're steering you astray. That extra stretch of patience may help you "stay calm and carry on."

I waited patiently for the Lord; he inclined to me and heard my cry.

3. If there's to be a giver, someone has to receive; so the receiver is a giver, too. You may try to give, but sometimes the other resists receiving. But when

they do accept your offering (whether a tangible gift or your earnest demonstration of going the extra mile with help or kindness) that acceptance of your giving creates a positive reward for you/the giver, too. Receiving gracefully, with a grateful heart, at Christmastime or any time, is also a kind of giving worth practicing. It is the gift of accepting another's efforts. Let someone give of themselves to you, as well as you to them. And when they do give to you, say a heartfelt, "thank you," and pay it forward.

Matthew 2:10-11

When they saw the star, they were overjoyed. ¹¹ On coming to the house, they saw the child with his mother Mary, and they bowed down and worshiped him. Then they opened their treasures and presented him with gifts of gold, frankincense and myrrh.

... and we *know* the Gift that the Magi, and all those that have followed since, received from our Lord, in return...

As faithful followers of Christ, especially at His time/*Christmastime*, we owe it to *Him*, to be worthy of *His* Christmas gift to us. The *very* best gift of all.

But what *I* can I give him? Give him my heart. Give him my heart
