When our last newsletter was published at Christmas, Joe Biden was still the President of the United States. Needless to say, the world has changed dramatically since Donald



COMMUNION AT YORKMINSTER PARK

The Worship Committee and Board of Deacons have recently discussed how Communion will be served at Yorkminster Park. Two key matters were considered:


- whether to continue using pre-packaged elements or return to cubed bread and cups of juice, and
- whether to serve Communion at the 11 a.m. service from the Chancel Table rather than the lower table at the foot of the steps.

After the pandemic, pre-packaged wafers and juice were introduced for hygiene reasons. Upon review, it was agreed that neither method raises theological concerns within our Baptist tradition. The pre-packaged elements remain more sanitary, require less preparation, and reduce waste. Since the wafer and juice are packaged together, serving time is also shortened. Given these advantages, the Worship Committee and Board of Deacons have decided to continue their use.

Communion was moved to the lower table after lockdowns, initially for social distancing and later due to the Minister's mobility issues following surgery. The question then arose whether to return to the Chancel Table. Neither location holds theological superiority. A table on the level of the people reflects Christ's humility in taking on human form, while a raised table symbolizes His crucifixion, resurrection, and ascension. Both have been consecrated for Communion – the lower table, now in the Friendship Room, formerly served at Park Road Baptist Church.

Practically speaking, the Chancel Table offers better sightlines, while the lower table is more accessible, requiring fewer Deacons to navigate the steps while carrying the elements. At its March meeting, the Board of Deacons decided that Communion at the 11 a.m. service will once again be served from the Chancel Table. The evening Communion will remain at the lower table, as has been the custom.





IN MEMORY

The Rev. Dr. Rex A. Mason, who served as Interim Minister at Yorkminster Park in 2000, a frequent guest preacher during the summer



months, and the 1989 Lester Randall preacher, died on February 17th at the age of 98. As a young man Rex served in the Royal Navytowards the end of World War II and later studied English at Oxford under C.S. Lewis. Dr. Mason was a distinguished scholar of the Old Testament who taught at Regents College, Oxford and also held several pastorates in Baptist churches in England and Wales.

One of his former students, Dr. Paula Gooder, commented on his warmth, wisdom, and humour at our recent online Lenten session. She said that the students never wanted his classes to end. He and his wife, Audrey, celebrated more than 70 years of marriage prior to her death in 2023.

We remember him for his love of scripture, his kindness and caring and the healing balm of his laughter and humour.

A memorial service will be held in late April at Sutton Baptist Church in the U.K.




YPBC WOMEN'S MINISTRIES













On a Saturday in January, almost a hundred women gathered in Cameron Hall for our annual women's retreat, led by Rev. Dr. Karoline Lewis. Our theme was based on her book, *Belonging – 5 Keys to Unlock Your Potential as a Disciple*, which offers an account, exclusive to the Gospel of John (4:1-42), of the longest conversation Jesus has with any character in the Gospels, a woman at a well. The length of Jesus' conversation with this unnamed, Samaritan woman, signals an important dialogue. It indicates that conversation is essential for an active and living faith, and we are meant to be in lifelong dialogue with Jesus, open to what he is revealing to us. The story also illustrates that faith and relationship take time.

The woman is a religious outsider living in Samaria, an area where Jews were not readily welcomed, and she is also a woman who will show us what it means to be a follower of Christ. Samaritans and Jews were considered enemies with a complex history of animosity.

This narrative intends to show us that this woman represents the world that God loves and that she is the least expected one to follow Jesus because she is a foreigner, shamed and shunned for her marital history. In John, discipleship is belonging, a reciprocal relationship that embraces mutual need and trust. God needs us to be witnesses in the world and we need Jesus.

The Samaritan woman's engaging story offers us **five elements** of discipleship to consider:

1 DISCOMFORT John 4:1-16

Jesus does not *have* to go through Samaria, geographically, to return to Galilee from Judea but he *has* to, theologically, because God loves the entire world (John 3:16). Jesus intentionally takes his disciples out of their comfort zone through Samaria to the town of Sychar, to show them what the world looks like and who the world is. He needs to find this woman to show his followers whom God truly loves as they will be called to do the same. To be a disciple is to be found where you least expect to be, and this is so for the woman at the well.

A second reason Jesus goes to Sychar is to find a witness in a new disciple. Jesus *has* to find this woman in order to fulfill John 3:16 and to anticipate his promise in John 10:16, that he will have other sheep, one flock with one shepherd. This story is the woman's own call to discipleship. Mutual need brings them to Jacob's well, considered a place of relationship, provision, connection, and betrothal. Jesus highlights the woman's loneliness, reflecting that she does not have a husband. It was in the bright light of noonday that she was open to a relationship with Him. In John, light and darkness indicate the status of one's relationship with Jesus and signify a person's recognition of and relationship with him. Jesus is the Light of the world that shines in the darkness and the darkness cannot overcome it (John 1:5). The woman is open, curious and willing to remain in conversation with Jesus even if it might expose who she truly is. We, too, need to go through Samaria to find ourselves and to be found by the one who loves us so much.

2 WONDER John 4: 7-15

Faith is not having all the answers. Jesus' disciples are in the city buying food and he and the woman are alone, having a conversation that society says they cannot have. Religious, familial and societal boundaries are being crossed because God so loves the world. She knows the conversation should not be happening and wonders how it is that this man, a Jew, is speaking to her. Jesus offers her living water and she notes that he does not have a bucket. She has to figure out where to find this water, water that keeps gushing up as a constant source of nourishment and life. Future life is right in front of her and it is in a relationship with Jesus. She comes to realize that Jesus has something she needs.

3 TRUST John 4: 6-24

The woman names her truth, "I have no husband." (In C1 Palestine, a woman would need to be married with children for survival, to have an heir to carry on the family name.) Jesus responds, "I know," with no blame, shame or Judgment. At that time, a woman had little control over her marital status. Her husband divorced her, the primary reason being barrenness. She would have had a lot of self-blame and shame. She is likely living with her dead husband's brother in a levirite marriage to survive. She has suffered many losses, but Jesus knows and will not abandon her. He knows her plight not her sin. Sin in the gospel of John is separation from God, not having a relationship with him.

There is no forgiveness mentioned in this text. Jesus comes to restore a relationship with God. In those days, there was a common wondering, "Where is God?" The temple is destroyed, and God is now in Jesus. Jesus is offering an abundant life that no one else has given her. The woman sees Jesus as a prophet, a truth teller and this gets her to the next level of conversation.

She says, "Our ancestors worshipped on this mountain...but you are saying that the place where people must worship is Jerusalem." She is asking, "Where is my God?," the most important question that separated Samaritans and Jews. Jesus is saying, "I am your God." Faith equals trust and it is relationship. The woman is trusting Jesus with her truth and he will trust her with his.

4 LETTING GO John 4:25-30

In the fourth part of the conversation, she learns that worshipping God is not in a location – it is in Jesus. The woman knows that the Messiah is coming and that when he comes, he will proclaim all things. Jesus says, "I am He. He is saying to her "I am God".

Jesus makes God known. John 1:18 says that Jesus is at the bosom of God revealing closeness, protection and sustenance. This is what belonging/discipleship looks like. The woman lets go of her water jug and goes into town to encourage people to, "Come and see a man who's told me everything I have done." Jesus has found her and sees in her, a witness.



5 WITNESS John 4:31-42

The woman is leaning into the identity that she has been given, a witness for Jesus. She is embodying what it looks like to be a disciple, "Come and see... Could this man be the Christ?" On the lips of the Samaritan is the word, *Saviour*. Salvation is to be in an abiding relationship with Jesus and it is to be shared.

The five keys to unlocking our potential as disciples are not answers, but beginnings that offer possibility and promise. If Jesus can go to Samaria to find the woman at the well, Jesus will most certainly go wherever it takes to find us, God's own beloved disciples who **belong** to him.

A Journey of Faith: from Rio to Toronto

My name is Jackeline Riedstra (Nascimento), I was born in São Gonçalo, a city in Rio de Janeiro, the granddaughter of Portuguese immigrants who made their way to Brazil in 1961. Growing up, life was not always easy. My family had many challenges, including struggles with addiction. My childhood was marked by periods of sadness but also with a deep sense of faith that would shape the person I am today.

Several years ago, during a World Mission weekend at my church, I randomly picked a Canada flag magnet from a box of countries to pray for. I was a bit disappointed at first – hoping for a country I considered to have more "urgent" needs – but I placed the flag on my grandmother's fridge and prayed.

My decision to study in Canada was completely unexpected. I had a list of countries to choose from and I was set on doing a six-month English program in Ireland, but God had other plans and at the last minute, I decided to come to Toronto. In 2018, I moved to Toronto to join an English program. I lived a very short distance away from Yorkminster Park. I had minimal to no command of the English language, but the church community

warmly welcomed me. After four years of working supporting newcomers from around the world in Canada, I have had the privilege of witnessing firsthand the struggles and triumphs of many immigrants. Through these experiences, I have gained a deep understanding of how challenging it can be for someone who has never been an immigrant to fully comprehend the profound significance of finding a place to belong – a place to call home.

Over the years, I have experienced personal and health challenges and like many newcomers felt unsure of where I truly belonged. But the faith and support I found at Yorkminister Park, especially through the Friday Life Group I joined in 2021, gave me the space to be myself and build friendships that I will forever take with me. This church has truly become my home away from home.

My years of church life in Brazil deepened my faith in God and I knew that my heart's desire was to serve in a local church. I never imagined that I would marry here and still be living in Canada. Looking back, I can honestly say that it was not by chance that I picked the Canadian flag.

For many immigrants, this sense of belonging remains a distant dream. I have also learned that when immigrants succeed, the entire society benefits. Their contributions bring diversity, new perspectives and unique talents that enrich the broader community, helping both the church and the nation to grow and flourish.

The warmth and generosity I found here combined with the opportunities to serve and grow have not only enriched my own life but also empowered me to contribute to the prosperity and vibrancy of this community. Six years ago, I walked through the doors of Yorkminster Park as a newcomer, uncertain of what to expect or how I would fit in. Today, I look back with gratitude on three incredible years serving on the Board of Mission, countless Sundays working

at the sound desk alongside the AV team, and another three years serving on the Board of Directors of CBWOQ - Canadian Baptist Women of Ontario and Quebec.

These years have been marked by growth and countless moments of witnessing God's work in ways I never could have imagined. From uncertainty to a sense of purpose, I have seen firsthand how faith and community can transform lives – not just my own, but also the lives of those we serve together.

A PROFILE IN SERVICE: TOM HAYES



When you see YPBC's **Tom Hayes** in church you are looking at one of our most recent 90-year- olds. You wouldn't know it. His energy and good humour are contagious. Both these attributes served him well as a dedicated Meals on Wheels (MOW) volunteer for over 25 years. In addition to essential meals, Tom delivered a daily serving of dignity and humanity to clients around Toronto.

MOW is a city-wide food program that helps meet the needs of those with food insecurities. These include seniors, homebound clients with disabilities, or anyone who finds themselves unable to meet the demands of daily meal preparation.

Tom started in 1995. In conversation Tom highlights the role as one who provides meals, but also basic social contact. "We are often the only opportunity these amazing people have for social interaction," Tom's done daily and weekly wellness checks. He has been called to be a handyman. Smiling, he notes, "I have even been asked to change lightbulbs!"

During his volunteer years Tom has seen the program evolve. "Our meals started with soup being made in large vats, then

we transferred the soup into Thermoses to be delivered." MOW now offers clients fresh and frozen meals to meet their dietary needs. Meals also cater to any food allergies they may have.

We asked Tom for insight for a new follower of Christ, one seeking to serve others. He replied "Christ commands us to be in service to others. And Mother Teresa said, 'The happiest among you will be those who serve others.' I have found that to be very true!"

Lighthouse Kids DOXA Youth

The death, burial and ressurection of Jesus Christ are the core foundation of the Gospel message.

Without the ressurection, our preaching is useless and so is our faith (1 Corinthians 15:14). Family Ministries has been studying 1 Corinthians and we have been richly blessed by God's word with Paul's letter to the church in Corinth. Recently, our focus learning and study has been on chapter 15. Paul says; "For what I received I passed on to you as of first importance: that Christ died for our sins according to the Scriptures, that he was buried, that he was raised on the third day according to the Scriptures..." (1 Corinthians 15:3-4). Amen!

Chapter 15 was also my Dad's favourite, and one that he continually wanted to discuss with me over a 2 year period of time leading up to his death. Our family enthusiastically honoured my Dad's belief in Christ and His love for proclaiming the Good News message by having the passage engraved on his grave marker.

I don't always remember to *slow down* enough, *observe* keenly enough, *look* hard enough, *hear* intently enough, to experience our Lord at work *when he's right in front of me*. I could do better. But I comfort myself that even Mary Magdalene looked up on that first Easter morning, saw Jesus there, and mistakenly thought He was the gardener. (John 20:15) "The Lord works in mysterious ways." We've heard that phrase all our lives, but you won't find this passage in scripture. It's a misquote from an English hymn written by William Cowper in 1773.

The actual quote was, "God moves in a mysterious way," (with guesswork that this lyric was drawn from Isaiah 55:8-9 NIV): "For my thoughts are not your thoughts, neither are your ways my ways," declares the LORD. "As the heavens are higher than the earth, so are my ways higher than your ways and my thoughts than your thoughts."

We know that God isn't *just* in His *heaven*, but *everywhere*... in our day-to-day, earthly experiences... in nature, our workplaces, our homes, communities, our hearts... *and in music*! And, yes, even oftentimes hiding between the lines of pop-culture tunes.

I believe that all of those gobsmackingly "serendipitous" events that happen to us aren't gobsmacking events at all, but, rather <u>GOD</u>-smacking ones! "Smacking" us with

loving "wake up" nudges to *pay attention; be aware; be ready*! Well God smacked *me* with one of those experiences the other day and there just might be something in my tale for you to apply and appreciate in *your* life, too.

A little background

The television was always on at my childhood home – from the moment my parents arrived from work, until bedtime. Even after lights out for me, I could hear the intro music to programs like Bonanza and Mission Impossible, Don Messer's Jubilee, The Tommy Hunter Show, and even sometimes Juliette right after the Saturday night Maple Leafs game, wafting up the stairwell from our old black-and-white Marconi. Lots of TV sounds in my home back then, but never on a Sunday. Sunday was for church in the morning, and LPs played on my parents' pride-and-joy Electrohome hi-fi stereo all afternoon (until time for Walt Disney, and Ed Sullivan, that is).

They played everything from Tchaikovsky, to Wagner, Handel and Mozart, to Glenn Miller, Guy Lombardo and His Royal Canadians, Peter Duchin, Roger Williams, Frank Sinatra, Nat King Cole and Duke Ellington, to Engelbert Humperdinck (that surname always made me giggle), Connie Francis, Dinah Shore, Doris Day, Bert Kempferdt, and Herb Alpert and the Tijuana Brass. Whew! and, of course Broadway show tunes! Broadway musicals aplenty – South Pacific, Carousel, The Sound of Music, The Music Man, Oklahoma... and Glen Campbell, too. Oh, how my mother loved Glen Campbell!

Many of these may seem like pop-culture melodies, without spiritual depth, but heard with a *different* ear, many pop-culture songs can be repurposed as faith-based music of praise and glory. Like the 1992 comedy movie, *Sister Act*, illustrated: 60's songs like Mary Wells', *My Guy*, Aretha Franklin's, *Rescue*

Me, Edwin Hawkins Singers', Oh Happy Day, and Peggy March's, I Will Follow Him, were all credibly sung in this flick, by nuns, about Jesus! Then there was Norman Greenbaum's, Spirit in the Sky, Tommy James & The Shondells' Sweet Cheery Wine ("To save us, He gave us sweet cheery wine; so very fine"). And plenty more in the 70s: Jesus Christ Super Star, I Don't Know How to l Love Him (Jesus), Put Your Hand in the Hand of the Man (From Galilee)... thinking right now of some I've missed???

But I digress. Back to Glen Campbell. Well, sort of... But I'm getting there, I promise. A few Sundays ago, our dear Family Ministries Director, Heather (Mackey), asked us (the volunteer leadership team) to recall the *first* time we let Jesus into our heart. I reflected long and hard on her profound question and eventually pinpointed my answer, but the essence of her query stayed with me the rest of the day and into the next morning.

My balance-of-day reflection made me think deeply about my darling mother (who died 29 years ago). I went to sleep that night with my mummy vividly on my mind, and tenderly in my heart. *Still* missing her, after all this time.

The next morning, I awoke with Glen Campbell's song, Wichita Lineman, in my head! (Such a pretty tune, with great strings accompaniment.) How about that? A bit random, but I sat with it, with a smile. I went downstairs, put the kettle on, took my dog out back, and then turned on my mum's vintage radio in our little cottage at the foot of the yard (a warm place for me to hang on bitterly cold mornings, while my pup took care of his "morning constitutional". What song was playing? That song!!! It's from 1969!? What were the odds??? 1.) A coincidence? 2.) Seren- dipity? 3.) Or a GOD-smack? I say, "Door number three!" I was missing my mother poignantly that morning and then

this! And the lyric that bought on my "water works?" "And I need you more than want you, and I want you for all time. And the Wichita Lineman is still on the line."

For the first moment, I repurposed this song to mean that my *mother* is "still on the line" for me anytime I want, if I would just "call home." My mother was like my own "Wichita Lineman!" – still available for comfort and counsel. But then tears of joy and in-the-moment experience of Jesus in my heart really gushed when I realized that these lines spoke even more deeply to me than a message from my mother. My revelation? Jesus is my "Wichita Lineman!" If He can appear as a Gardener, then can He appear to us as a Lineman, subtly planted in a pop-culture song!

And the "Wichita Lineman" – is still on the line." [Jesus is still on the line for us of all. Amen.]



YPBC Free Little Library



Our travels in Sweden began with attendance at our daughter's wedding more than 20 years ago. The wedding was held at the Axberg Church in a small town in central Sweden. The style and architecture of this church were both unique and visually attractive. This whetted my appetite to see more of Sweden's churches. So, visits to churches have been on the agenda for each subsequent trip.

In early conversations with the wider Swedish family, we heard of the beauty of northern Sweden. Years later we took a motoring trip to the far north, along the Gulf of Bothnia on the Baltic Sea, to as far north as Abisko National Park (latitude 68.3). The trip included five days north of the Arctic Circle in Swedish Lapland: this, during the celebratory days of midsummer in latter part of June. Churches of Sweden photographic exhibition has images of churches from Lund in the south (30 km from Copenhagen, Denmark) to Kiruna in the north (some 200 km north of the Arctic Circle). It includes

city and country churches, cathedrals and wooden chapels. Two of the churches have adjacent "Church Towns", a unique feature dating from the post-reformation period.

I got my first camera at age eight and over the years have sold several photographs, two of which have been featured on the covers (Toronto and Paris) of the Institute of Transportation Engineers International magazine Journal. Another of my interests is of a historical nature and I have had more than a dozen articles published in Generations, a publication of the New Brunswick Genealogical and Historical Society.

For nearly 14 years I was editor of the Yorkminster Park Baptist Church Newsletter.
