

FROM PETER'S PEN A WORD OF CAUTION

It seems a day rarely goes by in which I don't receive a phone call on either my cell phone or my landline from someone claiming to be from Revenue Canada to inform me that my Social Insurance

Number is going to be cancelled, or from someone claiming to be from VISA to say that there has been suspicious activity on my credit card, or from someone else claiming to be from Microsoft to inform me that my computer has a serious virus. Have you received any calls like these? All of these messages are scams. Each one is an attempt by someone to gain access to our accounts in order to steal money or even identity. They will inevitably ask for bank account information, SIN numbers, or computer passwords. **Do not give any personal information**. The best thing to do is to hang up immediately.

One scam I have heard about from several of our members and even from my own mother, specifically targets seniors. It comes in the form of a phone call from a young person identifying themself as your grandson or granddaughter. They will inform you that they have gotten into a bit of trouble, but don't want their parents to know and so could you please help them by delivering an envelope of cash to a particular address asap, but please tell no one. It is a scam. Hang up. There are many scams that target seniors and others that specificallytarget new Canadians and refugees.

Be warned. Last year alone in Canada there were almost **42,000 victims** of such fraud and **569 million dollars** was stolen from Canadians through such schemes.

Scam artists use not only the telephone, but also email. Members of the ministry team have received numerous emails from

someone using my name and informing them that I am in a bind and need help immediately with either money or gift cards. While the scam email will use my name, these emails all come from an email address that is not my own. Recently a senior in the church told me that she had received such an email and was very concerned for me and went to her bank ready to make a transfer. Fortunately, her bank told her the email was a scam.

Ignore any emails using my name asking for money or any personal information. I will never send any such email and neither will anyone in the employment of the church.

With the growth of Artificial Intelligence (AI) these scams will undoubtedly become more sophisticated. There may be phone messages in which someone's voice is being imitated, or even video messages in which their voice and face have been duplicated using sophisticated computer programming.

Yorkminster Park Day at the Daily Food Bank

Thanks to the forty-five volunteers who took part in the first annual Yorkminster Park Day at the Daily Bread Food Bank on Saturday, May 4th. Upon arrival we were met by the CEO, Neil Hetherington, who updated us with information about food insecurity in Toronto and gave us a tour of the remarkable facility. We then split into three teams to sort and box non-perishable food items to be taken to the warehouse for distribution.

As a church family we are very proud of Neil's leadership in our city and province. He is the face of the Daily Bread Food Bank and he continues to inspire people to not only offer support but also to address the underlying causes to the increasing problem of food insecurity. In 2023 there were more than two and a half million visits to food banks in our city. This number was an increase of one million from the previous year and reflects the fact that 10% of Torontonians now rely on food banks. At the heart of the problem is the cost of living. By the time the average person has paid rent, which on average for a one bedroom apartment in Toronto was \$2700 a year ago, as well as utilities and cell phone, there is just not enough left over to provide three square meals a day.

We all went away feeling we had learned more about the problem of food insecurity, that we had made new friends in the YP family and that we had been inspired by what we can do together to make a difference. Finally, thank you for all your kind words and warm wishes on the occasion of the recent Acadia University Convocation in Wolfville, Nova Scotia at which I was honoured with a special presentation. As I said to the graduates, I share this honor with my family and the wonderful people of my church without whom I would not be able to accomplish anything. And above all, thanks be to God.


FROM THE

When the Board of Deacons meet, one of the Deacons begins the meeting with a brief devotional and prayer. After John Schram offered the following devotional at the May meeting it was suggested that it be shared with the wider congregation. John served with the Canadian Department of Foreign Affairs for 36 years. After beginning his career in Nigeria and London, John and his wife Alena were engaged in the South African struggle against apartheid and the transition to democracy. From 1994 through 1998, he was High Commissioner to Ghana. He was Canada's Ambassador to Ethiopia, from 1998 to 2002;



and Ambassador to Zimbabwe from 2002 to 2005. Since retirement he focused on conflict resolution, peace building and development at the Norman Paterson School of International Affairs at Carleton University, and the Centre for International and Defence Policy, Queen's University in Kingston.

Devotional by John Schram on May7th at Deacons Meeting

Tonight, I'm going to ask you to think with me about something that must challenge us all – not least in our collective roles as deacons of Yorkminster Park Church.

I suspect that all of us are dismayed when we think about what is happening to ordinary, real people both here in Toronto and around the world. We look with shock beyond our own problems to see what people are doing to each other in the Ukraine, in the Middle East, in Sudan and Ethiopia and even Haiti – in all these places where ordinary people like you and me are caught up in fighting and threatened with starvation.

Although life can be tough for people right here in our Church and in Toronto, we can be grateful most of this suffering is far from Yorkminster Park and even Canada. But of course that doesn't let us off the hook of our faith community, of YPBC and of our role here as Deacons. Deep down inside, we must all know that people in the world's trouble spots are not that much different from us; they, too, love their kids and families; they share our ambitions; they don't want to be sick; they are hurt when someone they love dies. They want to protect what they have and they hope to improve their lives – to get a good job, good education for their children.

As deacons and as individuals, all of us are confronted with the question: "what do we do in the face of a topsy-turvy world; how do we help Yorkminster Park respond to a world where love and justice can seem far away.

Whether we are here in the midst of our muchblessed church community, or even if we are in the midst of hundreds of thousands of suffering people, we all need something absolutely sure that

we can hold onto. In short, we need to recognize our blessings and build on God's promises.

Many of us grew up singing "Count Your Blessings" and "Standing on the Promises". It's easy, even fun, to sing about these things. But for most of the world, it's often tough to face the reality of life. Yet time and again we see those who have faced terrible difficulties saying that they got though by reminding themselves of God's promises of good things amidst the bad. And so should we. If we want to find the strength and resolve to do something about life's iniquities, we should count our blessings. And we must believe and trust God's promises.

Look again at Romans 8:3:

... Then what can separate us from the love of Christ? Can affliction or hardship? Can persecution, hunger, nakedness, peril, or the sword? For I am convinced that there is nothing in death or life, in the realm of spirits or superhuman powers, in the world as it is or the world as it shall be, in the forces of the universe, and heights or depths – nothing in all creation that can separate us from the love of God in Christ Jesus our Lord.

That's quite a promise, quite a blessing isn't it?

Let us pray

Father God, here we are before you again – a small group caught between being grateful for all our blessings as mainstream Canadians, yet faced with the daily reality that many people in this world are far from sharing our good fortune. We want to be thankful for what we have been given. We want to remember and work for those who have so little and who are being so wronged.

Help us not to feel overwhelmed, much less to despair. Give us as church leaders the initiative to find ways to make practical contributions ourselves. Give us courage and give us the inspiration to help put the world's problems right. Give us the hope that however the world may look to us, you are in charge. And you have promised that you will support us in trying to bring faith, love and commitment to the work of Yorkminster Park Church in Toronto, across Canada and around the world.

A Journey of Faith By Issac Melsan


I grew up in a Christian household. My parents loved God so much that they wanted us to understand why they loved Him and how to love Him as much as they did.



A People's History of Christianity: the Other Side of the Story Diana Butler Bass. 2009.

This book was written in response to a comment from a close friend of the author's, who remarked that she "had no trouble with Jesus, it's just the stuff that happened after Jesus that makes me mad"; hence the subtitle of the book "The Other Side

of the Story". This is a spiritual journey to help us discern God's spirit through Christian history, telling us stories we may not know, or may have overlooked, or misunderstood.

The book is divided into five time periods, and includes numerous accounts of lesser-known individuals whose Christian thinking, ethics and practices provide instruction and direction for how we should act today. It includes a study guide, which makes it suitable for group discussion.

UPDATE FROM YP ART GALLERY

YPBC has received several generous donations of paintings, all of which are intended for permanent display within the building. These art works are a meaningful reminder of the donors and their love and relationship with Yorkminster Park. Emerald Lake - Howard C. Dierlam (d. 1975)

Howard C Dierlam was the first Director of Art of the Toronto Board of Education. Born in Waterloo, Ontario, his career as an arts educator was matched by a passion for painting, which he pursued in his spare time. Dierlam painted on location, with his work focused on traditional landscapes in oil, acrylic and watercolour.

Howard and his wife Florence were original members of Yorkminster Baptist Church, participating actively in the life of Yorkminster. Their daughter, Lois Dierlam (1933-2019), was also well known as an artist and arts educator.

In 2011, the YP Gallery hosted a father/daughter exhibition of the works of Howard and Lois ("Dierlam & Dierlam: A Legacy"). We are grateful to the Dierlam family for the donation of "Emerald Lake".



Stacked Linens (2018) - Janette Hayhoe

Janette Hayhoe's oil paintings focus on the 'everydayness' of contemporary life. Images of familiar objects and spaces have the power to evoke memory and psychological responses that call our attention to what is often overlooked. The fall of light on an object or space both describes and transforms the mundane.

"Stacked Linens" was part of Janette Hayhoe's solo exhibition "Objects & Interiority" hosted by YP Gallery in 2018. It has been donated by the family of the late Kathleen Llewellyn-Thomas Kenneally.



The Choir (2014) - Tony Kenneth Miller

Tony Miller's "The Choir" was created as part of a series of paintings, "The Journey", portraying the artist's family's history from Africa, slavery and eventual freedom in Canada. The painting is made in mediums consisting of oil, enamel and acrylic paint on stretched canvas.

STAYING SAFE WITH EMAIL:

SIMPLE TIPS FOR EVERYONE

Emails are a wonderful way to stay in touch with friends and family, but sometimes they can also bring unwanted surprises. It's important to know how to spot suspicious emails to protect yourself from scams. Here are some easy tips to help you stay safe.

1. Beware of Strange Senders

If an email looks suspicious, don't open it. Delete it right away.

When you receive an email, it's important to know who sent it. Scammers often send emails pretending to be someone you know or a trusted company to trick you into opening the email and following their instructions. This tactic is called "email spoofing."

When it comes to recognizing spoofed emails, there are a few key signs to watch for. If you receive an email from someone you don't usually correspond with, be cautious. Scammers often use generic greetings like "Dear Customer" instead of your name. Legitimate companies will never ask for sensitive information like passwords or credit card numbers via email. Beware of emails that use urgent or threatening language to prompt immediate action.


2. Look for Errors

If an email has several mistakes, it's likely a scam.

Scam emails often contain speling misteaks, grammatical errors, or awkward language that doesn't sound professional. These errors are a red flag because legitimate companies take great care in their communication.

If you notice unusual phrasing or many mistakes, the email is likely not from a trusted source. **Always double-check emails with noticeable errors**, especially if they request personal information or prompt urgent action. When in doubt, contact the company directly using a phone number or website you trust to verify the email's legitimacy.

The email on the right is riddled with multiple flags – spelling mistakes, grammatical errors, poor punctuation, and urgent messaging. SiriusXM would never send an email with this many mistakes.



3. Check the Email Address

Look carefully at the sender's email address. If it looks odd or unfamiliar, be careful.

Scammers often use email addresses that look similar to real ones but with slight changes, such as

extra numbers, misspelled words, or different domains. For example, an email might come from "support@amaz0n.com" instead of "support@amazon.com."


Always look closely at the sender's email address to spot these subtle differences. **If the email address seems off or unfamiliar, it's best to be cautious.** When in doubt, don't respond to the email and contact the company directly using a verified phone number or website.

4. Don't Click on Unknown Links

Hover over a link to see where it leads before clicking. If you're unsure, don't click it.

Links in scam emails can lead to dangerous websites designed to steal your personal information or infect your computer with malware (computer virus). Before clicking any link, hover your mouse over it to see the URL (website address) and check if it looks legitimate.

Be especially cautious if the link seems unrelated to the content of the email or if the email comes from an unknown sender. If you're unsure about a link, it's safer not to click on it. Instead, go directly to the company's official website or contact them through a trusted method to verify the email's content.




5. Attachments Can Be Dangerous

Don't open attachments from unknown senders. If a known sender sends an unexpected attachment, confirm with them before opening.

Attachments in emails from unknown senders can contain viruses that harm your computer or steal your information. Even if the sender appears familiar, be cautious of unexpected attachments. Scammers can hack email accounts to send malicious files to people on the contact list other email addresses.

If you receive an attachment you weren't expecting, verify its legitimacy with the sender before opening it. As a rule, **never open attachments from unknown sources** to keep your computer and personal information safe.

The HTML file attached at the bottom of this email is likely a malicious file. Messages like this should deleted immediately.




6. Watch for Urgent Messages

Take your time. Verify urgent messages by contacting the company or person directly using a phone number or website you trust.

Scammers often use urgent or threatening language to create a sense of panic and prompt quick action without thinking. Emails that claim "Your account will be closed" or "Immediate action required" are designed to rush you into making mistakes.

Always take a moment to verify the authenticity of such messages. Legitimate companies usually provide ample time and clear instructions for addressing issues without creating a sense of urgency. If you receive an urgent message, contact the company directly using a trusted phone number or website to confirm if the email is real.

In this example the sender is pretending to be Netflix. The subject line and messaging in the email is threatening that if you don't enter your payment information, your account will remain suspended. Note the grammatical errors in the sender's name and the cryptic messaging at the bottom of the email.



7. Protect Personal Information

Legitimate companies will never ask for sensitive information via email.

Never share personal information such as passwords, your social insurance number, or bank details through email. Legitimate companies will never ask for sensitive information via email. If an email requests this information, it is likely a scam attempting to steal your identity or financial details.

Always be cautious and verify any request for personal information by contacting the company directly through a trusted method. Protecting your personal information is crucial to maintaining your privacy and security online.

By following these simple tips, you can enjoy the benefits of email while keeping yourself safe from scams. Remember, it's always better to be cautious and take your time to verify emails before taking any action.
